# **UX Interview questions / "script"**

#### Plan:

- ~5 mins introduction (greet, explain interview plan, sign consent forms)
- ~15 mins general information behaviour and search needs
- ~15 mins example searches using the Library catalogue (video-captured)

### **A.** Introduction

A0 What programme are you on?

Explain interview procedure (above) + gain their consent

## **B.** General information behaviour and needs

**B0** What resources do you use when looking for information? (e.g. Library website, specific databases, Google, Bing, bibliographies, lists of new publications, etc.)

**B0a** How does the Library catalogue compare with other resources?

**B0b** Do you tend to start looking in different places, depending on whether you are searching for a specific item (i.e. known title or citation) or browsing (e.g. for all items on a certain subject or by a certain author)?

**B1** Do you have a preference as to whether your information is available in print or online?

**B1a** What formats of information do you use? (e.g. full-text; abstracts; reviews; citations; blogs; videos, etc.)

- **B2** How many results do you normally hope to get from a single search query? **B2a** If you get a lot of results, how many of them (or how many results pages) do you normally check before refining / altering your search query?
- **B3** How do you decide which results are useful / relevant to you?
- **B4** Does the reliability or the authority of the information source matter in your searches?

**B4a** How do you decide whether a source is reliable / authoritative?

**B5** Does the date of information matter in your searches?

**B5a** At what point would you consider information to be out of date? (e.g. more than a year old, more than five years old, etc.)

**B5b** If you cannot access the latest edition of a particular item, how satisfied are you with using the previous edition?

#### C. Example searches using Library catalogue

Ask interviewee to articulate their thought-process while searching in as much detail as possible. Also inform them that we want to find out how they go about searches – this means that there is no 'wrong' way, and also that we will not offer advice or guidance with their search. Please feel free to adapt these queries; it may be better in the first instance to suggest that the interviewee create their own searches. The purpose is to do one subject-based search (to determine how they browse and what helps them to select materials to use) and two specific-item searches (to determine how they search for known items).

**C0** How would you go about searching for and selecting materials on a topic of your choice?
